This Bill: provides for domestic violence and lethality assessment training for law enforcement officers and reporting requirements.

Discussion: The sponsor said this bill creates a domestic violence and lethality assessment training as part of Peace Officers Standards and Training ("POST"). The bill creates an optional hybrid program trainings conduct by POST.

Bill: HB 334, Special Needs Training for Law Enforcement Amendments

Sponsor: Rep. Eliason

This Bill: requires peace officer training to include training on autism spectrum disorder and other mental illnesses.

Discussion: Rep. Eliason said this bill requires training for law enforcement officers on how to handle the specific challenges involved when answering a call about an individual with a mental illness, autism or other neurological disorder. Sen. Thatcher voiced support for the bill. Sen. Kennedy asked to strike the word neurological from the bill. The sponsor did not want to make that change and the committee had no desire to delete "neurological disorder". The Disability Law Center, members of the public, the Utah Eagle Forum and the Utah League of Cities and Towns voiced support for this bill.
